The Manistee Blacker Airport Authority envisions a management/operations scenario wherein the vendor would provide complete, "turn-key" operations of the airport to the Airport Authority working under the direction of the Airport Director to manage all hiring and employment of airport maintenance staff, provide Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting (ARFF) services, provide compliance with Federal Aviation Regulations (FAR) Part 139 Operational requirements, and maintain the airfield, as well as, Airport owned facilities and equipment.

In addition, the vendor would also provide appropriate Fixed Base Operator (FBO) services to the aviation users of the airport.

It is anticipated that the Airport Authority will provide the equipment and supplies necessary for the vendor to operate the airport, while the vendor would provide all equipment and supplies necessary to conduct their FBO operations and services.

It is expected that qualified firms will provide the following services:

- A. Ensure compliance with FAR Part 139 requirements to maintain the Airport's FAA Operating Certificate (AOC):
 - 1) Work with the Airport Director to comply with the Airport Certification Manual (ACM);
 - 2) Under the ACM insure that required FAR Part 139 certification items related to airport operations are fulfilled, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - i. Inspect and insure the proper maintenance and repair of all safety areas (per §139.309);
 - ii. Inspect and insure the proper maintenance and repair of all marking, lighting and signs (per §139.311);

- iii. Prepare, maintain and insure that a snow and ice control plan is followed (per §139.313);
- iv. Insure that all aircraft rescue and firefighting response equipment, agents and documentation is compliant with the Airport Certification Manual and law (per §139.315, .317 and .319);
- v. Insure that proper procedures are maintained and training provided for the handling and storing of any material regulated by the Hazardous Materials Regulations (49 CFR 171 through 180) (per §139.321);
- vi. Insure that proper traffic and wind indicators are provided and maintained (per §139.323);
- vii. Inspect the Airport to assure compliance with Part 139 requirements in accordance with required schedule (per §139.327);
- viii. Insure that objects which are marked or lighted, per FAA regulations are maintained (per §139.331)
- ix. Insure there is no inadvertent entry to the movement area by unauthorized persons or vehicles, reasonable protection of persons and property from aircraft blast and fencing that meets the applicable FAA and TSA security regulations (per §139.335);
- x. Provide for the collection and dissemination of airport condition information to all proper individuals and entities (per §139.339);
- xi. Insure the proper marking and, if appropriate, lighting of all construction and unserviceable areas (per §139.341);
- xii. Whenever requirements of this Section cannot be met, limit air carrier operations to the portion of the airport not rendered unsafe (per §139.343)
- 3) Conduct all required daily, monthly, quarterly, semi-annual and annual inspections as required by the ACM for the airfield and equipment and provide records to the Airport Director.
- 4) Conduct and maintain required personnel training and maintain corresponding records
 - i. Vendor to provide all required training to their personnel as required under Part 139
 - ii. ARFF recurrent annual training will be paid for by the Authority.
- 5) Provide sufficient ARFF coverage as required for all commercial air service flight operations and maintain corresponding records.
- 6) Maintain accident and incident data, in cooperation with the Airport Director
- 7) Issue and maintain required Notices to Airmen (NOTAMs).
- 8) Follow and comply with the Airport Emergency Plan (AEP) as required.
- 9) Comply and implement the Wildlife Hazard Management Plan (WHMP) including required recurrent annual training

- B. Maintain the airfield, airport owned facilities and airport owned equipment:
 - 1) Provide janitorial services for the terminal and all Authority owned buildings
 - 2) Provide airfield pavement and lighting maintenance to comply with FAR Part 139
 - 3) Provide airfield vegetation maintenance (mowing, etc)
 - 4) Provide airfield and airport snow removal
 - 5) Provide basic maintenance for the airport terminal, airport owned hangars and other airport owned facilities
 - 6) Provide basic maintenance for airport owned equipment
 - 7) Provide basic maintenance for the perimeter fence
- C. Provide FBO Services to airport users in compliance with the minimum standard provisions of the Airport Rules and Regulations:

Required Services:

- 1) Aircraft fueling services:
 - i. Conduct fueling operations using Airport owned fuel farm and fueling equipment
 - ii. Maintain the Airport owned fueling equipment
 - iii. Collect and remit to the Authority any required fees imposed by Authority
 - iv. Maintain fuel records in compliance with Airport and FAA requirements
- 2) Collect and remit any Authority imposed fees (i.e. landing fees) for aircraft handled by the FBO.
- 3) Manage parking and tie down areas used for the storage of aircraft.
- 4) Provide basic flight-line services and ground handling for General Aviation aircraft.

Supplemental Services:

The Authority believes the following "Supplemental Services" enhance the airport; however, these services are not budgeted services by the Authority. To clearly and equitably assess RFP responses, if the respondent plans to provide any of the following services, please list them separately in your response and note that the Authority is not expecting to provide financial support for the provision of these services.

- 1) Aircraft rental services
- 2) Flight training services
- 3) Air Charter services

- 4) Aircraft and engine maintenance/repair (specify type of aircraft for which services is provided)
- 5) Fuel truck
- 6) Aircraft deicing service
- 7) Aircraft ground power service
- 8) Specialized flight services (including but not limited to scenic air-tours, aerial applications, photography, advertising and fire patrol)
- 9) Terminal vending machine concessions
- D. Operate and maintain Authority owned Airport assets, as outlined in Exhibit 2 with high standards of management, operations and maintenance:
 - 1) Perform effective and efficient maintenance operations, and conduct cross training of employees to ensure proper coverage of duties.
 - 2) Coordinate with the Airport Director, within the approved airport operating budget, according to the Airport Authority Purchasing Policies and FAA purchasing guidelines, for the procurement of all equipment, tools, appliances, materials, and supplies reasonably necessary for the care, maintenance and operation of the airport.
 - 3) Conduct routine property inspections and reporting.
 - 4) Implement and document preventative maintenance on all vehicles and equipment.
 - 5) The term maintenance here means that the vendor shall provide the labor for all regular basic maintenance and regular preventative maintenance for the airfield, facilities, and equipment. The Authority shall be responsible for providing all maintenance supplies, parts and equipment. Maintenance and repairs outside of basic maintenance shall be the responsibility of the Authority.

Respondents should provide the following:

- 1) Provide an initial strategic plan (maximum of three pages) detailing Vendor's ability to preform required services, supplemental services (if applicable), and to assist airport in its growth objectives. Examples might include, private and/or public investment into on airport facilities such as hangars, maintenance facilities, etc., additional on airport businesses, or any other growth opportunities.
- 2) Provide prior experience as an FBO and operational successes. Include at least two letters of support from prior clients for which Respondent has provided FBO or aviation services.
- 3) Each Vendor shall provide financial statements for the three (3) most recently completed fiscal years, demonstrating its financial ability to successfully execute its Proposal, including any anticipated capital investment. Financial statements should include:

- i. Opinion Letter (auditor's report)
- ii. Balance Sheet
- iii. Income Statement
- iv. Statement of cash flow
- v. Footnotes; provided that, if any set of financial statements did not include, when prepared, any of the above, then the Respondent will include an explanation for such non-inclusion
- 4) Respondent shall provide an annual lump sum amount required to provide the required services detailed in sections A-D above which shall be billed to the Authority monthly.

Background Information

The airport is a FAR Part 139 non-Primary Commercial service airport and part of the federal Essential Air Service (EAS) program. The airport has two runways, 10/28 is 5,501 ft. and 1/19 is 2,721 ft. MBL has instrument landing capabilities.

Commercial air service through the EAS program is provided by Contour Airlines operating ERJ and CRJ jets. Contour has interline agreements with American and United airlines. Currently Contour operates two roundtrip flights per day to Chicago (ORD), providing connections across America and around the world. The current EAS contract is for a three-year term, October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2027.

MBL is a non-Primary Commercial service airport, but expects to achieve Primary airport status in 2025. MBL is currently on track to achieve 40% growth in enplanements this year with the new commercial service being provided by Contour Airlines.

The airport also serves the general aviation (GA) market, and currently offers services to the GA community through the FBO. The current FBO also provides aircraft rental and air tours of the region.

The airport is owned and operated by the Manistee Blacker Airport Authority.
